


Bay Area Education Data Snapshot

The San Francisco Bay Area is a resource-full, unique, diverse region. One of the key resources in the region is the education of our 2.3 million young people. How are we doing by our children and youth?

All communities and students across the Bay Area have strengths and talents, but opportunities and resources for student success are not equitably distributed. The data in this report show the latest available information on key metrics related to student success, aggregated across all 9 counties in the Bay Area. We offer this baseline aggregation of data to support informed and innovative approaches to advancing educational equity and justice throughout the region because we all have a stake in education. We also include an appendix with additional data for each Bay Area County. Working together locally and regionally, we can improve educational and life outcomes for our children and youth.


Race/Ethnicity of Bay Area Children & Youth (0-25 years)^{1,2}










3rd Graders Who Met/Exceeded English Language Arts Standards, 2021-22⁸



8th Graders Who Met/Exceeded Math Standards, 2021-229




Students Who Were Not Chronically Absent, 2017-2022¹⁰



Bay Area Teachers Who Were Fully Qualified, 2020-21¹¹




Bay Area Student Suspensions Not Due to Disruption or Defiance 12




Bay Area Students Who Graduated High School Within 4 Years, 2021-2213

Senate Bill 274 (Skinner, 2023) would permanently extend the ban on willful defiance suspensions in middle and high schools after 2025.
